Subject: A. Anthropology

Purpose: B. The Anthropology collection is primarily intended to support undergraduate research and teaching to the Bachelor level as well as individual faculty projects.

Academic Programs Served:

C. The Anthropology collection supports programs primarily in the Department of Anthropology. Degrees are offered at the Bachelor of Arts level and the Bachelor Of Science level with concentrations in Archaeology or Biological, Cultural or Linguistic Anthropology. In addition, there is a Forensic Science minor available. Various aspects of Anthropology are of interest to other disciplines such as Art, History, Music, and Sociology.

Collection Guidelines:

D. Languages: Materials are collected in English only.

Chronology: Periods collected range from the pre-history to the present. Current materials and imprints are emphasized.

Geography: Geographic guidelines are not appropriate for this subject. North American and Western European imprints are emphasized.

Notes/Comments:

Lower and upper division textbooks are excluded. Faculty research interests focus on African prehistoric archaeology, Caribbean ethnography, evolutionary studies, and biological anthropology (specifically Peruvian mummified remains).
